Completion Tasks

We also recognize that we are at the "Crossroads' stage in our Lifecycle, needing to decide whether to continue our current path, or embrace transformation for the future.

Desired Newness

United States

Brazil

United States: Synthesis of All Responses

1. What are the most important completion tasks that are ours to do as a country?

Additionally, there is a need to address issues related to properties and sponsored ministries. It is crucial to develop a comprehensive plan for our assets, including properties, buildings, and finances. This plan should involve specific steps for activation and processes to manage the psychological and emotional impacts on sisters due to losses and changes. Many have shifted their perspective on "completion" to see it as an ongoing process of planning for a future beyond themselves, aiming to live with dignity while gradually moving toward a vision for new life. Education in the aging process is necessary to prepare for current realities and to realistically assess mutual expectations.

2. If we were to accomplish these tasks, what is the New Life we hope could emerge as a result?

By accomplishing these tasks, we would free ourselves from the lack of planning, alleviating anxieties and uncertainties. This newfound freedom allows us to respond effectively to contemporary needs in alignment with God's people and creation. It broadens our spiritual perspective, potentially leading to new ministries that cater to the growing spiritual awareness among the laity.

3. What is the soulwork you need to do, personally and as a country to succeed in these efforts?

1. What are the most important completion tasks that are ours to do as a country?

- Form partnerships with other congregations facing similar situations.

- Begin associating more with other religious congregations, such as the Sisters of Mary Immaculate.
- Increase openness to joining other groups of women religious.
- Work on improving openness not only to other religious groups but also to laypeople and associates.
- Renew leadership by avoiding the re-election of the same sisters to promote transformation.

2. If we were to accomplish these tasks, what is the New Life we hope could emerge as a result?

If the outlined tasks are accomplished, the new life that could emerge involves several key aspects:
